Learn what to look for. Know how to check for head lice.

What to look for:

Head lice are very small and move quickly through dry hair.

Look for more definitive evidence such as nits(eggs), bite marks and feces.

Nits vary in color from brownish-grey to yellowish-tan and are half the size of

a sesame seed.

Nits are always oval shaped, smooth and cemented to one side of the hair shaft.

- They are most commonly found behind the ears and on the crown.
- New bite marks present themselves like a bright red pin point dot.
- Feces resembles the look of sand only black and is very sticky.



How To Check For Head Lice:

- Have good lighting, a magnifying visor or lens, then separate and part the hair looking near the root of hair for nits.
- * Examine all sides of the hair shaft as nits are laid only on one side.
- ❖ Begin screening on one side of the head and work your way around the back of the head to the other side. Examine the crown of the head.
- If you see anything suspicious test it, try to move it.

 If it easily moves or falls off, it is not a nit.
- Nits are difficult to remove and must be pulled all the way down to the end and off the hair shaft.
- Be sure to take notice of the shape, feel and color of what it is your testing, make sure it's consistent with nits.
- Have a closer look in the general area if you find one nit, as the female lays in groupings.


Wet-Combing Method or Chemical Treatment Method?

The Wet-Combing Method

- Focuses on breaking up the life cycle.
- Lice and nits are manually removed every few days for 2-3 weeks.
- Any lice that hatch after the first comb out are easily removed with each subsequent comb out long before they can reproduce.
- Head lice can not become resistant to this method and it's most successful when working with a high quality tool such as the Lice Meister comb.

Chemical Treatment Method

- These include special lotions, creams or shampoos that are applied to the hair and scalp.
- They work the same way, in addressing most of the live lice.
- None of these product affect the nits (eggs) in any way.
- A second and often a third and forth application is necessary, as removal of the nits is the most important step and must be done even if you use chemical treatments.

Frequently Asked Questions

What are lice?

Head lice are human parasites that live entirely on your head. They can not even survive on your pets.



Do head lice spread diseases?

No, they are not know to transmit any disease agents. However, secondary infections may result if the skin is broken by repeated scratching.

Who is most likely to get head lice?

Head lice are found on people of all socio-economic levels. Head lice are not concerned with the conditions of the hair only the blood feed it knows is there when it follows the hair shaft to the scalp.

Do I need to clean everything in my house everyday?

No, head lice are not an environmental issue, head lice can only live off the head about 24-48 hours. Some light cleaning may be needed after the first initial treatment but after that it's best to focus your energy on the head. Remember, homes don't head lice people do.
